Course Description

This 9 module course is designed to help teachers find specific answers and actions for some of those difficult moments in classroom management. These simple techniques are effective with all students, from toddlers to teens. This course offers teachers classroom philosophy and management skills, whether new to teaching or experienced teachers.

Overview of the Course

Readings, Activities, and Assignments

Students will participate in dialogue, watch video, role-play, and use their Love and Logic workbook each day. In addition, there will be an end-of-the-day short quiz the first two days and a short final upon the completion of the third day. One-page goal-setting and reflection papers will also be required.
